Note Taking Methods

1. Paraphrase:

- appropriate for supporting information, biographical information, predictions, hypothesis, and drawing conclusions
- put the information into your own words
- information must be cited

2. Summarize:

- typically used for beginning research, i.e., general explanatory material
- read a large section of text for overall meaning and summarize in one or two sentences
- information must be cited unless it contains common facts and knowledge

3. Copy and paste:

- select and copy <u>small portions</u> (2-4 words) of text such as specific details, facts, definitions, and statistics
- cite this kind of information if it gives you a new or unique perspective

4. Direct quotes:

- reserved for one or two sentence statements that prove a point or reveal an attitude – use to back up your point
- appropriate for primary sources such as diaries, journals, speeches, interviews, letters, memos, manuscripts, memoirs, and autobiographies
- information must be in quotation marks and cited
